Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared W. S. Bailey,
 who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid
 pension claim, deposes and says: My name and address is as above,
 aged years, occupation laborer.

I have been seeing this Sabal Sanders since 1893
 she has been living near me since then. I never saw
 her husband but once or twice in my life and I only knew
 him by the name of Tom Sanders. I don't know a thing
 about whether he has ever been married before or not.
 What has been Mrs Sanders reputation since you have
 known her? Ans. Well, it has been pretty bad since
 I have known her. People claim she makes her living
 like all the rest of the sporting women and that
 she gets a little pension. She has been keeping
 for me one to three girls since I have known
 her, Vic Fisher, Dutch Kate, Ann Hodgson,
 and Minnie Lipes are 4 girls who
 have lived with her during the past 3 years.
 and Dutch Kate and Vic Fisher are there
 now. All four of these girls are regular
 prostitutes. My wagon would Mrs.
 Sanders up in town last week and
 we took her but for her and a fellow
 so far which was used as a bed. Dutch Kate was
 moved with Mrs Sanders.

Mrs Sanders diva has been convicted the
 toughest place there is around here.

The man from Coals Ferry came down
 there some months ago along in the summer
 it was in the evening and Mrs Sanders got mad

at him shot. It about 3 times as I heard and beat him over the head with her fist. I have heard that this was written up in the papers.

Our Davis & John Relligan got into a fight at her house in the Spring or Summer, and there were some other fusses there but I don't know any by hearsay.

After Mr. Sanders had beaten that fellow up with her fist she was in bed for a few days.

There is a man named Barnes living here in town (Christian name unknown) who in the past 3 or 4 months has run his wife away from home as is reported, and she is now said to be laying up with Mr. Sanders.

I have been in Mrs. Sanders house several times in the last year, have broken up her garden and such as that, and when I was at work I would see men coming and going but I was never in a position to see what they did. I never saw her showing intercourse with any man.

There is a man named C. Barnes living in town who is reported to have separated from his wife on account of Mr. Sanders last Summer a year ago, I don't know whether Barnes still runs after the widow or not.

Did you ever have intercourse with this woman yourself?

I have not nothing to do with her no way, closer or far.

I know this pensioner Isabel Sanders, who until the past few days had lived just across the creek from me within 100 yards of me, for 3 or 4 years. I don't know what regiment her husband was in and I believe his name was Sam Sanders.

She has been keeping a girl or two ever since she has lived by me, & has them nothing more or less than a house of prostitution and the reason she left this house the creek and moved into town was because the house is too small. She told me out of her mouth that she was moving because there was not enough room in it for the people she had. There was but one girl "Dutch Kate" who moved with her. and Dutch Kate is not related to her. I was inside in her house and never saw her having intercourse with a man, though men go there and recently she beat a man up with the butt of her revolver and she shot at him twice but did not hit him. She is a hard drinker and I have frequently heard her cursing and shouting, when she gets drunk she never gets

not doors and about in any direction and
bells from the pistol have struck my
house twice.

There is a man named John Smith living in
the country who has been coming in
to stay a day or so with the wife
since she has lived near me.

Whether they do anything out of the
way I don't know except to drink and gamble.

Everyone around here regards her

as a prostitute and were glad
when she left.

The soldier told me he shot a woman in
 Brookridge Co. Ky. near Clonfork but he
 claimed to me that he was not married
 to her. They had ~~three~~ 7 children ~~to~~ who
 were "laid" to him and one she shot
 from some one else.

I don't know of living about what her
 name is, nor heard of it called that
 I know of.

C I don't know any person around Clonfort Ky as I never lived about there.

From what I can learn, soldiers lived about Clonfort before he went into the Army.

I think he married this Belle at Vincennes Ind. Her maiden name was Belle Pieper.

The soldier was my cousin, but

I know nothing about him now here who lived just back of the Edge Tree road in Indianapolis.

I am not interested in this matter in any way.

This statement has been read to me and it is correct.

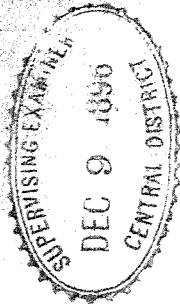

The plaintiff Hiram T. Saunders states that he has been a resident of this state for more than a year last past, and is now a bona fide resident of the county of Breckenridge, state of KY.,

He further states that on or about the 20, day of Dec. 1867, he was married to the defendant of this county and circuit, and that he lived with her as a faithful and obedient husband until on or about the 5, day of March 1872, when the said Amanda, as he avers regardless of her marital duties toward this ~~man~~ plaintiff willfully abandoned without good cause therefor and has since wholly refused to return. and by her acts continues perverse, and persists in thus living separate and apart.

Plaintiff further states that the cause of divorce accrued in this state and within five years next before the commencement of this action. He states that there is no question of property between them, as she took her part with her, that there were and are two children born unto them, the oldest named James R. Saunders, the other Wm. Thomas, aged respectively about five and two years of age, that this defendant has the care and custody of the youngest and the defendant has the oldest; but that the defendant is not a suitable person to have the care and custody of said child, that she does not bring him up in moral courses and very much abuses his said child.

I am 60 years of age; my post-office address is Coloursport Pa. Res. 11 miles N. W. of there - Occupation farming I knew Wm J. Sanders commonly called Tom Sanders from boyhood. His folks came from Edmondson Co Ky. they moved from there to Illinois - after the war Wm J. Sanders came back in here and worked for me before he married Annella Parker - they went to Hardinburg Ky to be married - neither of them had been married before. After marriage they lived over by Hardins mill - he left his wife when his children were small - he had two children by Annella - he lived with her about 4 years - they lived over in Indiana awhile - He left her here - she has been living here ever since - she is a working woman - she raised two mighty fine boys from Tom - Bill & Jim - she has another son Arven who is not the son of Wm J. Sanders in my opinion - she says he came in and saw her once and got that way but I don't know of that and he don't favor Tom at all - this boy goes by name of Arven Sanders - I don't know if he ever getting a divorce from Tom - I don't know whether Tom ever got a divorce from her - I saw Tom at Spottsville in 1875 - that was before he had married this other woman - he had been out to see the Pickett woman so he said - Arven saw her - It was in fall of 1875 I saw Tom down there and have not seen him since - he had been gone from here then some time - Yes over a year - Can't say how long - If Tom was back here in Dec 1875 I didn't see him or hear of it - looks like I would if he had come -

directly after Saw Tom down by Sportsville heard that
 he had married the Pickett woman - heard of Tom
