

he established his home in Owensboro, where he purchased the Planter Hotel, of which he was manager until 1930. Other business interests, however, have occupied his attention at various times and all have profited by his enterprise and progressiveness. In 1922 he organized the Vincent-Curry Motor Company of Owensboro, handling the Studebaker line of cars until 1926, when Mr. Vincent disposed of his interest in the business. In the preceding year he had organized the Vincent Grocery Company of Owensboro for the conduct of a retail grocery trade, in which he engaged until 1928, when he sold out. About the same time he formed the Vincent Cigar & News Company, conducting business under that name until 1929, when he withdrew from that field. On selling the Planter Hotel in 1930 he purchased the Rudd Hotel, which he now manages. It is a modern hostelry, supplying a complete and excellent dining-room service and catering in every way to the needs and requirements of the traveling public.

Mr. Vincent is a member of the Owensboro Masonic Lodge, No. 130, and of the First Baptist Church, in the work of which he is very active, doing all in his power to further its interests and extend its influence as a factor in the moral progress and upbuilding of the community. His firm belief in democratic principles has led him to become an active party worker and he managed the campaign of Judge M. M. Logan, now senator, when the latter was elected judge of the court of appeals. Since then Mr. Vincent has been an untiring laborer in democratic circles and managed the campaign of Governor Laffoon in 1931. The democratic headquarters for Daviess county are in the New Rudd Hotel, Mr. Vincent having donated this space for that purpose. He is liberal in his financial support of the party as well as untiring in his efforts to advance its success. He assisted in organizing and financing the Young Men's Democratic Club and also the Women's Democratic Club of Daviess county. From 1931 until 1934 he was secretary and treasurer of the Daviess county campaign committee and in 1931 and 1932 was a member of the county election commission. On May 15th, 1935, he was elected to the position of Chairman of the Daviess County Democratic Executive Committee and is serving in that capacity at present. He is a man of broad vision and his keen insight into political situations has enabled him to do most effective and beneficial work for the party.
